Title *Jupiter* â??Known as â??Joveâ?? is the god of sky and thunder in Ancient Roman Mythology and the chief of the gods. Father of Fortuna and great protectorâ?•(*Britannica*); *Fortune* Fortuna is the goddess of fortune and luck in ancient Roman mythology.

11 *Votâ??ries* â??A devoted or zealous worshipper of a particular god [or] goddessâ?•(*OED*).

16 *Toast* â??The reigning belle of the seasonâ?•(*OED*).

26 *Levees* â??A morning assembly held by a prince or a person of distinctionâ?•(*OED*).
